





Habitat for Humanity

Cornerstone Creek Section 1 Down Payment Assistance

- ✓ Central Oklahoma Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit dedicated to helping individuals and families build and improve their homes.
- ✓ The organization is currently constructing the "Cornerstone Creek" housing community.
- ✓ ARPA funds are supporting Habitat in advancing homeownership access in Oklahoma County through a Down Payment Assistance Initiative. This program helps lower barriers to homeownership by providing down payment support to eligible individuals and families with limited to moderate incomes.

LVFD Fire Engine-Tanker & SCBA Upgrade


- ✓ The Town of Luther undertook a dualpurpose emergency services enhancement
 project, acquiring a new fire truck and
 upgrading its inventory of Self-Contained
 Breathing Apparatuses (SCBAs).
- ✓ This new tanker allows for broader coverage which enables the department to respond more effectively to incidents such as structure fires by deploying a betterequipped team and delivering water to the scene more efficiently.
- ✓ SCBA upgrades Enables up to 15
 firefighters to operate in IDLH (Immediately
 Dangerous to Life and Health)
 environments, significantly improving
 rescue and containment capabilities.

CarePortal Fulfillment


- ✓ The 111 Project collaborates with churches to support families and children in crisis through the CarePortal platform.
- ✓ CarePortal links social service agencies, including the Department of Human Services (DHS) and approximately 100 other partners such as schools and pregnancy centers, with churches.
- ✓ Agency partners submit requests into the system based on the needs of the families they assist.
- Churches, along with community members, organizations, and businesses, can then respond to these requests.



Whiz Kids of Oklahoma

Whiz Kids program

- ✓ Whiz Kids of Oklahoma is a non-profit dedicated to supporting children from highpoverty (mainly Title I schools, primarily ages 7–8 and up), many of whom face significant socioeconomic challenges such as food insecurity, unstable housing, and family trauma.
- ✓ The Whiz Kids program focuses on providing one-on-one mentoring, literacy support, and consistent adult relationships, which research and participant anecdotes indicate are key drivers of positive educational outcomes.
- ✓ The program's holistic approach of combining literacy, mentorship, emotional support, and community resource connection — has contributed to improved reading skills, greater stability, and hope for children facing adversity.

Oklahoma Opry

Oklahoma Opry Education Center

- ✓ The project enabled the purchase of a building for the Opry Heritage Foundation of Oklahoma, which will house an Education Center for music programs, including a music school for low-income children and a program for veterans.
- ✓ Beneficiaries include children who qualify for free/reduced lunch (receiving music lessons at a nominal fee) and veterans (receiving free music courses and instruments).
- ✓ The new facility has generated excitement among students, with increased enrollment and anticipation for expanded programming once renovations are complete.
- ✓ The project is expected to help restore prepandemic participation levels and allow all programs to operate under one roof for the first time in 48 years.


Peaceful Family Solutions

Spanning the Gap

- ✓ Peaceful Family Oklahoma (PFO) is a nonprofit focused on supporting children and teens affected by addiction in their families across Oklahoma. Established in 2014, PFO offers free, evidence-based programs like peer-to-peer day camps, school initiatives, and family support groups to promote healing and resilience.
- ✓ Peer-to-Peer Model: Children with similar lived experiences come together to process their feelings, build resilience, and learn coping skills in a safe, supportive environment.
- ✓ School-Based Programming: In response to community needs and the pandemic, PFO expanded its reach by developing school-based programs and adapting curricula for a broader age range, now serving children ages 4–18.
- ✓ Family Support: PFO offers monthly family support groups and family pop-up events, providing ongoing opportunities for families to connect, heal, and build community.







Lillian Timber Farms

Serinity Blooms

✓ Serenity Blooms, an innovative program operated by Lillian Timber Farms, is focuses on holistic mental health and well-being. The program transforms the community garden and local church spaces into "third spaces" where participants of all ages (from children to seniors) can access traditional mental health therapy, yoga, tai chi, meditation, and gardening activities. These services are provided free of charge and are designed to support mental health, build community, and promote participant engagement and retention.



Field and Future

Empowering Title I Communities

✓ The School Sports Initiative, led by Fields & Futures in partnership with Oklahoma City Public Schools, is a transformative effort aimed at revitalizing athletic infrastructure, increasing student participation in sports, and fostering community engagement across Title One schools.

ARPA dollars have been used to create school-connected play spaces and provide safe, high-quality environments for athletic practices and competitions.





Millwood Public Schools

Facilities Improvement

- ✓ Millwood Public Schools has used project funds to upgrade and maintain their athletic facilities, with a focus on the softball field.
- ✓ Due to financial strain worsened by the COVID-19 pandemic, the district has struggled to fund these types of improvements independently.
- ✓ The project ensures facilities are safe, functional, and inclusive—especially for students with disabilities—supporting physical health, mental well-being, and academic performance.

Students expressed pride in having a varsity softball team for the **first time in two years**, directly linked to the completion of the field.



The City of Bethany

34th Street Healthy Living and Active Community

- ✓ The Bethany Sidewalks Project is a community-driven initiative designed to improve pedestrian access in a historically underserved area.
- ✓ The project involved installing approximately 300 feet of new sidewalk, strategically connecting residents to essential local services including the library, the All-Abilities playground, the YMCA, municipal court, police department, and city hall.
- ✓ This enhanced access supports a wide range of community programs such as youth services, daycare, exercise classes, cancer support groups, English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction, computer classes, and more.









Oklahoma Railway Museum

LeFlore Depot Restoration


- ✓ The Railway Museum Project is focused on the restoration and repair of a historic depot building dating back to 1908.
- ✓ The project includes both exterior and interior renovations, such as upgrading with ADAcompliant features, painting, trim work, insulation, sheetrock, electrical upgrades, and HVAC installation.
- ✓ The restored building will serve as the museum's main entrance, ticketing area, gift shop, and administrative offices.
- ✓ These improvements are designed to transform the depot into a welcoming entrance helping to preserve Oklahoma's railroad heritage as part of the museum's planned expansion.
